Thurso pupils take their classroom out into the peatlands

Children from Pennyland Primary School, Thurso, have put on their wellies and taken the classroom outside to learn about the peatlands. The children were taking part in the Alan Joyce Young Environmentalist Competition which this year is being organised by Strathnaver Museum in partnership with the Heritage Lottery-funded Flows to the Future Project.

Sjoerd Tel, Learning Officer with the Flows to the Future Project, has already led pupils from six local schools out on to the bog for an afternoon of fun and environmental education. He explained, "It's great to have the children out in their own local area. They might be familiar already with peatlands because they play there or take the dog for a walk. But now, hopefully, they will better understand what the soggy stuff is really all about"

Christopher Pearson, teacher from Pennyland Primary, said "The pupils enjoyed the outdoor activities. For some it was even their first time up on Thurso moors".

During the learning session the children thought about climate change and the important role played by the peatlands on their doorstep. Many of them have entered the competition by sending in a photograph and caption which represents what the peatlands mean to them.

The Alan Joyce competition is dedicated to the late biology teacher and keen environmentalist from East Sutherland. The winners will be announced later this month and the children's work will form part of a display at Caithness Horizons on 27 July 2015.

Following these events Sjoerd Tel is planning the further development of a Flow Country Learning Programme that seeks to connect more school children to peatlands in a fun and inspiring way. The Strathnaver Museum and the Flows to the Future project also plan to keep working closely together in future. Looking further ahead the project team believes that the planned Field Centre with a classroom and residential facilities at Forsinard will greatly expand the learning opportunities available to school children and others in the area.
