The Partnership includes the Environmental Research Institute (North Highland College), the Flow Country Rivers Trust, Forestry Commission Scotland, the Highland Third Sector Interface, Highlands and Islands Enterprise, the Northern Deer Management Group, The Flow Countries Rivers Trust, Plantlife International, RSPB Scotland, Scottish Natural Heritage and The Highland Council. It is chaired by Professor Stuart Gibb of the Environmental Research Institute in Thurso.

# **Displaying the Flows**

### What and Where?

Fantastic new displays are now in place across the Flow Country. Strathnaver Museum (Bettyhill) focuses on the traditions of peat in the community. Caithness Horizons (Thurso) and RSPB Forsinard Flows Visitor Centre (on the A897 between Helmsdale and Melvich) show the importance of the peatlands for people and the environment. This includes hands-on displays, interactive technology, and our film about the Flows. Caithness Horizons also has floor jigsaws and costumes for kids (and maybe adults too!) to enjoy.

### Why?

We're passionate about the Flow Country and we love to share that. Now visitors and locals can enjoy finding out more about this fabulous environment.

### When?







The RSPB Forsinard Flows Visitor Centre is open 9am-5pm from April to October.

### Who?



# Free advisory service for land managers in the **Flow Country**


The Flows to the Future Project offers free advisory support to farmers, crofters and estate managers who wish to sustainably manage or restore their peatlands using a number of current funding opportunities including:

- Agri-Environment Climate Scheme (AECS) which can provide funding for blanket bog and heath used for deer stalking or rough grazing in the Flow Country.
- Peatland Action (a Scottish Natural Heritage administered fund) which can provide funding for peatland management not funded through AECS, including gully blocking, hag reprofiling and bare peat restoration.

Restoration The Flow Country stores three times as much carbon as all the UK's forests, making it a vital carbon sink, but this can only happen when the peatlands are healthy and still forming peat. By removing some badly sited plantations and restoring the habitat to peatland we are not only helping biodiversity, but also doing our bit to address Climate Change.
